

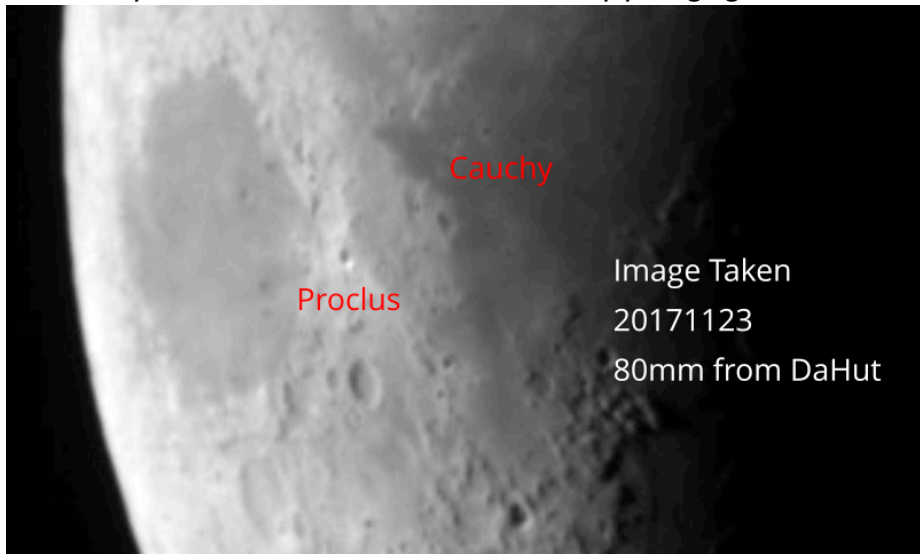

From the New Atlas of the Moon...

At Full Moon, a small bright point stands out against the vast gray expanse of Mare Tranquillitatis. This is Cauchy, a small crater near the edge of this sea. The high albedo or reflectivity of this crater attests to its relatively young age....

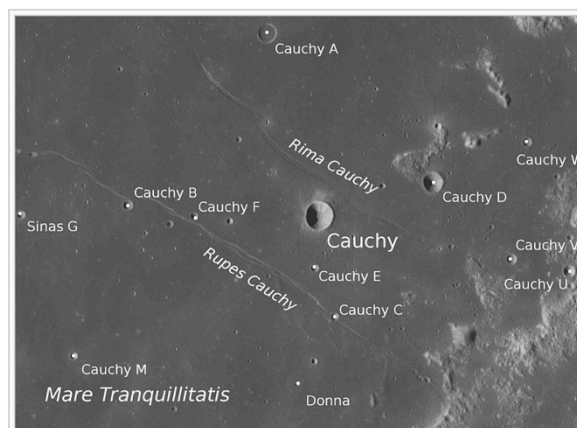

Cauchy lies between the Rupes Cauchy and the Rima Cauchy, as described below.

South of Rupes Cauchy are two [lunar domes](#) designated Omega (ω) Cauchy and Tau (τ) Cauchy. They lie to the south and southwest of Cauchy respectively. Each lunar dome has a small depression at its crest, which is likely to be a volcanic vent rather than an impact crater. The vent at the top of Omega Cauchy is called [Donna](#).
